## Big night for WA writers

ERTH writers Sarah Rossetti and Heather Nimmo won AWGIE awards in a gala presentation at The Hotel Sofitel in Melbourne last night.

Both were recognised in the radio category, with Rossetti collecting the Ian Reed Award for best script by a first-time radio writer for her experimental Surface Paradise-set, Surfers Tension.

Nimmo won the prize for best adaptation from her unproduced television series about the mining industry, written with John Cundhill.

Another Melbourne-based Andrew Bovell, was a joint winner with Ana Kokkinos and Mira Robertson for best film adapta-

The trio turned Christos Tsioklas' controversial novel Loaded, about a gay, drug-tak-ing Greek-Australian teenager, into the film Head On, starring Alex Dimitriades. It competed at the Cannes Festival in May and will open at Cinema Paradiso on August 13.

This year's major award, the Gold AWGIE, went to Andrea Lemon for her play Rodeo Note.

Other major winners in the 31st annual AWGIEs included the teams from Full Frontal and Good News Week in the nonformat comedy category, Richard Tulloch, for his youth theatre play Body and Soul, and Deb Cox, for best original screenplay, Dead Letter Office, to be released next month.

The AWGIEs are awards in a prestigious Australian writing competition. Presented each year by the Australian Writers Guild, they cover film, television, stage and radio and are judged by guild members.

The Ian Reed Award is the second AWGIE for Rossetti, who in 1996 won the category of children's drama for her episode Culture Clash in the Channel 7 series Bush Patrol. The episode won the screenplay section of the WA Premier's Book Awards.

One of Perth's busiest writers, Rossetti is flying straight from Melbourne to Broome for the premiere of her short film Pilbara Pearl. She is working on a documentary on crayfishing, a screenplay for an Italian-Australian co-production and a novel. Nimmo is working hard

in her new Leederville offices. She has two low-budget features, a romantic comedy and a comedy drama, awaiting production and her play The Other Woman is under consideration by several theatre companies. Her plays One Small Step and Whispering Demons won WA Premier's Book Awards in 1993 and 1995. Gillian Berry produced the Rossetti and Nimmo plays with local actors at the ABC, attesting to the strong local tradition of radio drama nurtured by The West Australian's former arts editor David Britton.
